



Undergrad Award Honouree Profile: Dr. Pippa Hall

Dr. Pippa Hall entered family medicine in 1985 after a brief career in teaching. Her journey in Palliative Care started with a Palliative Medicine Residency Fellowship in 1994. She gained her M.Ed. and became an Assistant Professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Ottawa in 2000. She was appointed as a Full Professor in 2010. During this time she has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals on interprofessional education and collaboration. She also developed innovative educational programs spanning the continuum from undergraduate students and residents to health care practitioners and collaborated with uOttawa Faculty of Arts Theatre Department for many of her innovations.

Back in 2002, Dr. Hall developed and implemented "*Death made Visible*", the first interprofessional undergraduate course at the Faculty of Medicine for medical, nursing and theology students using literature to explore issues relevant to death and dying. She was instrumental in the development of the e-Portfolio as a tool in the development of the physicianship program for the Medical Undergraduate program at uOttawa. In 2012, Dr. Hall received a CIHR Meeting, Planning and Dissemination grant for "Arts and Humanities in health professional education: What is the impact?" for a meeting held in Ottawa.

In 2015, Dr. Hall became an AMS Phoenix Fellow. Her project is entitled "Connections and relationships: building interprofessional education (IPE) through the Humanities".
